

TRIBUTE TO DEAN

There was a stuffed falcon in the room, a battered bird whose head had been twisted and cocked for expression until it had come off entirely. And there were gnarled roots and prickly, peculiar nuts, and feathers and strings and branches in the classroom.

And up above, from the ceiling sometimes there hung something, some macramé or kite a student had made. A poster announcing the Q-Tips paint-with-swabs contest. Student work. A pot, bisque-fired orange, the bottom baked right off.

You might sketch that pot one day, or that falcon. You might paint the gnarled root on paper two-hundred times its size, blowing it up until it appeared to be a huge, menacing form in space, with every crevice and crease exposed and colored in blacks and grays.

"Draw what you see!" Mr. Barber would say. So you drew the stool you sat on, or the creek bed behind the high school (the legs of your stool slowly sinking in the sand), or you drew downtown Charlotte, the Festival in the Park, the roofline of the Greek Orthodox Church. You drew yourself. You drew...

Mr. Barber.

Mr. Barber looking pensive, his beard cupped in his hands. Mr. Barber behind the trees. Mr. Barber lying down. Multiples of Mr. Barber, all in a row, in boxes- a picture you composed.

That unforgettable face, with eyes that crinkle when he laughs, (a gleeful, high-pitched good laugh), and a trim beard. "I am Napolean," he announces to students who look back at him, gape-mouthed. "I am! You don't believe me?" he says to them, and he stands, one hand tucked into his shirt by his heart.

Yes, he is Napolean all right.

You wanted him to like you. You didn't want to be tight, the way he was not. You wanted to laugh with him, to catch the meaning of what he was saying, to let go.

What he wanted was for you to be yourself. If he made anyone uncomfortable, it was because he needled them a little, trying to find the real person inside.

No point in putting on a show, being sophisticated (how ludicrous, to be sophisticated at seventeen), or lazy. Mr. Barber saw through every fake, every excuse. You wanted to be true to yourself, like him. And you wanted to work hard, like him:

On a morning in early spring you could find him at the counter in the back, with stacks of mats in front of him that he had cut the night before. He would call to a student to bring over a painting, and then zip, he would draw the mat-knife across new cardboard. Soon he'd take 175 paintings, pots, and tapestries to the scholastic competition- all labeled, matted, and overseen by him.

You wanted to work that hard. "It was tacky", he said, "to do any less". It was tacky to be timid. Tacky to be so self-conscious, so intimidated that you couldn't even speak up. It was tacky, too, not to think for yourself, not to be yourself without fear. That's what many of us awkward, timid, and tacky teenagers learned from him.

Draw what you see, but better yet, take the trouble to see. Put down that line- not a shaggy, pale, little line, but a bold, continuous line. Don't hesitate. Don't erase. Take pains.
