MPHS Graduates Organize Fundraiser For Memorial Scholarship in the name of Dean Barber. Art Teacher

Several Myers Park High School graduates are organizing a fundraiser to establish a memorial scholarship in the name of Dean Barber, their art teacher.

"It is only fitting that this fundraiser pays tribute to an outstanding teacher at Myers Park High School – Dean Barber – who inspired so many students," said Randy Farmer, an organizer of the fundraiser and graduate from Myers Park High School in 1983. "This fundraiser also reflects the many ways in which a great teacher, such as Mr. Barber, can influence a student's life."

"Dean Barber quite simply was the best teacher I ever had," Mr. Farmer said. "While my career aspirations did not lead me into the arts, Mr. Barber did influence my decision to work in the field of education. While I was a social studies teacher at Grady High School in Atlanta, Georgia, I always felt like I knew what excel-



lent teaching looked like because I had had Dean Barber. I always aspired to achieve the same level of success with my students that he had with his students."

Establish a Scholarship

So, to honor Mr. Barber's legacy, and to encourage other Myers Park graduates to pursue similar aspirations, a non-profit called Education Works, Inc. was organized to sponsor the fundraiser. The money will be raised for a scholarship to be given annually to a Myers Park High School graduate. The scholarship will be awarded based on the candidate's artistic endeavors, overall academic achievement and commitment to public service. The fundraiser, started in December, 2006, has a campaign goal of \$25,000.00.

Education Works is a 501(c)(3) non profit corporation and is an all-volunteer organization. Fundraising Asking Donations and Other Support

Of course, the fundraiser is seeking donations from individuals and corporations. Besides donating money, the fundraising campaign needs assistance in locating Mr. Barber's students to let them know about this campaign. Tracking down his former students and other interested individuals can be difficult and time consuming. So, help is very much needed in all areas.

In addition, former students are needed to donate their art work for display or for auction. The fundraiser would like to do an auction as a way to raise money. The fundraiser will also seek foundation and corporate support to achieve its campaign goal of at least \$25,000. The fundraiser will raise money from individual donations, an auction, foundation grants and corporate donations.


Artists

Mr. Barber, as he was always called, prepared me well for the challenges I face in design school and also gave me the confidence in myself to succeed in a visual field. He cared more about helping me develop my skills than any other teacher or friend or family member for that matter. I'd return to campus to say hello whenever I'd be back home and he'd stop the class and let the students ask me all about college and my career path and use me as an example of the possibilities that art could open up for someone if they had the desire to create for a living. Of course, many in his classes did not go on to become artists or architects, but of those who I stay in touch with, their appreciation for the visual world was greatly affected by their experience in his class, and by his demanding and loving instructions. We were all so lucky to have had him at that time in our lives.

Quote from Miles:

For my art, what I got from Mr. Barber is a mindset, an approach, which is in me, yet must be summoned before starting every piece and reminded during the piece. Don't fear your art. Don't let the art control you. Mr. Barber wouldn't say these lessons but rather let you hover over your master piece, for several days, till you felt you were finished. He'd then say, "Now cut it up. Cut the piece in to many tiny squares. Batik the squares, place them on this." Ball it up, cut it out, leave Norman Rockwell, find you.

In class, we would draw negative space. Mr. Barber would select an item in the classroom, we were not to draw the item, but the spaces in between, where the item wasn't. For another day, another item selected, Mr. Barber would instruct: look at the object, don't look at your paper, keep your eyes on the object, draw the object, don't lift your pencil, keep your pencil to paper until done.

Background on Dean Barber

A native of North Carolina, Mr. Barber taught art at Myers Park High School from 1963 to 1987. His accolades as an educator were numerous. Every year, Mr. Barber entered his students in the Charlotte-area Scholastic Art Competition. His students won numerous awards and prizes at that competition, usually around 20 or so. His students also were entered into other area, regional and national art competitions, where their art work was similarly honored. Of course, several students won scholarships to art colleges and institutions, like Pratt and Columbus College of Art and Design. Other students went on to careers in architecture and other arts-related fields.
